Important Note:

This amigurumi is worked with tight X-shaped and spiral stitches. Do not close off each row unless indicated; make sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before starting. We have a tutorial on our channel to make this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions. If you find any errors in this pattern, please contact me.





With this pattern you can create the essential characters of the Nativity scene: Mary, Joseph and Baby Jesus, as you see in the image. Each one has been designed with a level of detail that will make your Nativity scene stand out for its beauty and delicacy.

Here are the approximate measurements for each character, but it is important to remember that these dimensions may vary depending on the material you choose to use, as well as the thickness of the needle and the tension with which you knit:

- Mary and Joseph: 15 cm
- Baby Jesus in his basket: 7 cm

Each character has its own charm and style. With the right colours and details, you can personalise your nativity scene as you wish.

We provide you with the full range of colours we used for Mary, Joseph and Baby Jesus, allowing you to achieve a similar look. However, you are welcome to customise the colours to suit your style and preferences.

Colors used for Maria:

- Old rose for the body
- Meat or skin for hands and head
- Strong cinnamon for hair
- Orchid blue for the coat
- Mango yellow for the halo
- Tobacco for the waist cord

Colors used for baby Jesus:

- Cinnamon for the basket
- Straw for the blanket
- White and flesh or skin for baby Jesus
- Mango yellow for the halo

Colors used for Jose:

- Burdeos red for the body
- Meat or skin for hands and head
- Strong cinnamon for hair
- Fresh green for the coat
- Gold for the tunic
- Tobacco for the cord on the waist and the cane



Yarn used:

• For this project I used Sinfonía yarn, made of 100% mercerized cotton. This yarn has an approximate thickness of 3 mm and is made up of 6 strands, which gives it a soft and high-quality finish.

Materials:

- 2.5mm hook
- Black sewing thread for embroidering the eyes
- Silicone glue stick
- Wire to articulate the amigurumi
- Go to work
- Scissors
- Time marker
- Pins
- Stuffing for amigurumis
- Blush for your cheeks is optional.

Abbreviations:

- R: Round
- ch: chain stitch
- MR: Magic ring
- sc: single crochet
- dec: decrease (close 2 sc
 together)
- inc: Increase (2sc in 1 stitch)
- dc: double crochet
- hdc: half double crochet
- ss: Slip stitch
- FLO: Front Loop Only (take only the front strand)
- BLO: Back Loop Only (take only the back strand)





Baby Jesus Start using white yarn R1: AM 6sc R2: 6inc (12) R3-6: 12sc Change to flesh-colored yarn https://youtu.be/E41vDZsXR1w?t=209



Use:

We will always do the color change using this technique, as it is easier for us and ensures a clean finish. However, you can do the color change using any method you prefer, adapting the pattern to your personal style.

R7: FLO 12inc (24) R8-11: 24sc R12: (1sc, 1dec)x8 (16) R13: 8dec (8) R14: 8sc



When you finish R14, cut the thread leaving enough length to close using a tapestry needle. Before doing so, it is important to stuff the piece very well to ensure the proper shape.

To embroider the eyes, first place pins between R9 and R10, leaving about 6 stitches between them. Try to center the pins as much as possible. Using black sewing thread, using double strand and a tapestry needle, we will embroider the eyes just above the R9. This embroidery is very basic, but if you consider it necessary, you can check out the video where we explain the process in detail.

Using white color yarn R1: MR 6 sc R2: 6inc (12) R3: (1 sc, 1 inc) x6 (18) R4: (2 sc, 1 inc) x6 (24) R5-9: 24 sc



https://youtu.be/E41vDZsXR1w?t=870 When you finish R9, cut the thread leaving enough length to make a perfect closure. With this closure we achieve that the join of the piece is less visible. Every time we mention making a "perfect closure with a tapestry needle", we will be referring to this technique. For a better understanding, please consult the link to the video where we explain the process in detail.



Next, attach the hat to the head. At the back, secure it very well to the knitted piece using white thread. It is not really a hat, but rather a "cocoon." Sew with only two strands of the same thread to join the hat together, or use glue if you prefer.

Halo of the baby Jesus R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16) R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24) When you finish R3, make a perfect closure using a wool needle, ensuring a neat finish on the piece.

Join the halo to the head, making sure that you can see it from the front, but not too much. Use glue to join the halo only to the lower part of the head.

Basket

Using cinnamon-colored yarn: R1: 6ch, starting in the 2nd ch (4sc, 1 triple inc) x2 (14) R2: (4 sc, 3 inc) x2 (20) R3: 5 sc, 4 inc, 6 sc, 4 inc, 1 sc (28) R4: 6 sc, 6 inc, 8 sc, 6 inc, 2 sc (40) https://youtu.be/GUBHDA31z00?t=113



R6: 1 ch, 40 dc, 1ss (40)

R7: 1 ch, (2 dc front post, 2 dc back post) x10, 1 ss (40) R8: 1 ch, 40 dc, 1 ss (40)

R9: 1 ch, (2 dc back post, 2 dc back post) x10, 1 ss (40) R10: 1 ch, 40 sc, 1 ss (40)

The "back post" is the same as what we call "relief stitch", where we take the stitch from the previous round from behind. If you are not familiar with this technique, please check the video, as we will use it several times throughout the pattern.

When you finish the last slipped stitch of R10, make a perfect cast off using a tapestry needle to ensure a neat and clean finish on the piece.

The R11 will be performed at the bottom of the basket. For more clarity, please refer to the video where we show how to do it.

Secure and hide the strands neatly so that they are not visible. This will help give a clean and professional finish to your project.



Forget

Using straw-colored yarn: R1: MR, 8 sc R2: 8 inc (16) R3: (1 sc, 1 inc) x8 (24) R4: (2 sc, 1 inc) x8 (32) R5: 1 sc, 1 inc, (3 sc, 1 inc) x7, 2 sc (40) R6: (4 sc, 1 inc) x8 (48) R7: 1 ss, (2 ch, 1 ss) x48 https://youtu.be/GUBHDA31z00?t=1010



When you're done, cut the thread.

There's no need to leave it long; just pull it back to the back, secure it, and hide it. Then, arrange the piece in the basket as you like.

We will make 2 base bodies using the same pattern, but with different colors for each one. Below, we share with you which member each body is for and the specific colors we will use for each one:

Base bodies for the characters:

- Maria: Old rose and flesh or skin
- José: Garnet red and flesh or skin

The demonstration will be done using colors other than those mentioned above, but you will use the appropriate colors.

Brazos (x2)

Start using the appropriate color for the skin

R1: MR 8sc

R2-5: 8sc In the last sc of R5 Change to the appropriate color yarn for each body https://youtu.be/xMIAhbnHC4E?t=302



R6: FLO 8inc (16) R7: 16sc R8: 16sc back post R9-11: 16sc

At the end of R11, it is necessary to place the hand inside the sleeve to ensure that it is well positioned.






R12: (2sc, 1dec)x4 (12) R13-16: 12sc R17: (1sc, 1dec)x4 (8) https://youtu.be/xMIAhbnHC4E?t=658



Make a perfect seam at the end of each arm. This will make it easier to join the body later and ensure a clean, neat finish.





Body

yarn color for each body R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16) R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24) R4: (2sc, 1inc)x8 (32) R5: 1sc, 1inc, (3sc, 1inc)x7, 2sc (40) R6: 40sc back post https://youtu.be/xMIAhbnHC4E?t=885



R7-8: 40 sc

After finishing R8, place the base on a flat surface and apply hot silicone glue. Make sure to heat up your glue gun very well, as the heat will allow the base to set on its own. When the silicone cools, the base will become firm, allowing your amigurumi to stand very well on its own.

If you prefer, you can also place a button that is the same size as the base, or cut a piece of plastic that works well as reinforcement. I do not recommend using cardboard, as it could deform over time and affect the stability of your amigurumi.

R9: (3sc, 1dec)x8) (32) R10-14: 32sc R15: (6sc, 1dec)x4 (28) R16-20: 28sc R21: (5sc, 1dec)x4 (24) R22-24: 24sc R25: 4sc 4sc joining one arm, 8sc, 4sc joining another arm, 4sc (24)

For this arm join, you will take the stitch from the inside out, and in turn, a stitch on the body. Unlike the next round, where you will work in each stitch that you left free on each arm.

R26: 4sc 4sc joining in one arm, 8sc, 4sc in other arm, 4sc (24) https://youtu.be/xMIAhbnHC4E?t=1430





R27: 24 sc

After R27, put stuffing on the body before continuing to close. Be careful not to put too much stuffing so that the base remains flat and the amigurumi is stable. https://youtu.be/xMIAhbnHC4E?t=1614



R28: 12dec (12) Change to the same color of yarn that I used on the hands R29-30: 12sc

After finishing R30, wire each arm. This is optional; you can leave the arms unwired if you prefer. However, by wire-wiring, the excess will be left on the head, which will allow Mary to be positioned very tenderly, especially by having her look towards baby Jesus.

R31: FLO 12inc (24) R32: (1sc, 1inc)x12 (36)

After R32, I suggest you add a little more stuffing to the body, especially around the wire in the neck area, to ensure a firm and stable shape.

R33-43 :36sc R44: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30) R45: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24)

Stuff the head after finishing R45, always trying to keep the wire as centered as possible. Keep in mind that when you finish the last round of the head, you can add more stuffing if you consider it necessary to give it the right shape.



R46: (2sc, 1dec)x6 (18) R47: (1sc, 1dec)x6 (12) R48: 12sc

When you finish R12, cut the thread leaving enough length to completely close the head using a wool needle.


You have now completed a body. Remember to repeat this process one more time, using the correct colors for each character or the ones you have chosen.

Let's continue embroidering the eyes of Mary and Joseph, since the design of the eyes is the same for both. Place pins between R36 and R37, leaving approximately 8 stitches of separation between them. Then, higher up, between R37 and R38, place two pins for each eye, forming a triangle.

Use black thread and double strand to embroider the eyes, using the pins as a guide to obtain a symmetrical and neat position. You can check out the video for more details on the process.





Mary and Joseph's cloak follows the same pattern, but using different colors of thread. For Mary, use orchid color, and for Joseph, fresh green.

Use appropriate color of thread for each one Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 71ch, in the 2nd row start BLO 70hdc (70)

R2-7: 1ch, turn BLO 70hdc (70)

R8: 1ch, turn BLO 31 hdc, 4dec hdc, 31hdc (66)

R9: 1ch, turn BLO 29 hdc, 4dec hdc, 29hdc (62)

R10: Join, 31ss joining one side to the other, 1ch to secure.

When you're done joining, turn the piece over to make sure everything is properly assembled and in place.




Mary's hair Use strong cinnamon colored yarn R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16) R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24) R4: 1ss, (25ch, in the 2nd begin BLO 24 hdc, skip 1st, 1ss)x12

When you finish the last stitch of hair, pull the strand back, secure it and hide it for a clean, neat finish.

Make an additional detail between R5 and R6 by sliding the stitch. This will give a nicer finish to the piece. For more clarity, please refer to the video where we explain the process.

Joseph's hair

Use strong Cinnamon yarn R1: MR 6sc R2: 6inc (12) R3: (1sc, 1inc)x6 (18) R4: (2sc, 1inc)x6 (24) R5: 1sc, 1inc, (3sc, 1inc)x5, 2sc (30) R6: (4sc, 1inc)x6 (36) R7-13: 36sc R14: 1ss, (6ch, in the 2nd st start BLO 5hdc, skip 1st, 1ss)x18

When you finish the last slip stitch of this hair, secure it and hide it. Keep in mind that, for Jose, we are going to flip this hair to achieve the proper finish.


Use strong cinnamon colored thread Start with a slip knot 19c, in the 2nd start, 2sc, 14hdc, 2sc, 7pd, 4c, skip 4sts, 7pd, 1chain to secure and leave long tail to sew

Joseph Tunic

Use gold thread Start with 1 slip knot R1: 37ch, in the 2nd start BLO 36hdc (36) R2: 1ch, turn BLO 36hdc (36) R3-4: 1ch, turn, BLO 16hdc (16) R5: 1ch, turn, BLO 16hdc, 21ch R6: in the 2nd ch start BLO 36hdc R7: 1ch, turn, BLO 36hdc(36)

When finished, make a chain to secure, break the thread and hide it carefully for a neat finish.



Using tobacco-colored thread, make two cords for the waist, one for Mary and one for Joseph.

- For Maria: Start with a slip knot and weave 50 chains.
- For Joseph: Start with a slip knot and weave 60 chains.

Once you have finished all the rounds, prepare the wire and place it inside the piece. Then, close the fabric using a wool needle and adjust the desired shape to give it the final finish. https://youtu.be/Y3G5luS-TxE?t=2401





To join all the pieces, we will use hot silicone glue. However, if you prefer, you can also sew the pieces together. Please note that I have not fixed the cloak with glue, so you can adjust it according to your preference. The waist cord is only tied, without needing to be fixed. I encourage you to watch the video through the shared link, in case the images are not enough to guide you through the process.
