Important Note:

This amigurumi is worked with tight V-shaped and spiral stitches. Do not close off each row unless indicated: make sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before starting. We have a tutorial on our channel to make this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions. If you find any errors in this pattern, please contact me.





This amigurumi is approximately 25cm tall, and you can articulate its body. This amigurumi stands on its own.





Important Note:

This pattern can be adapted to create amigurumi of different sizes using yarn of different thicknesses. Adjust the hook size according to the thickness of the yarn selected. Also consider the size of the safety eyes if you decide to use them.

I hope you enjoy designing this pattern for yourself as much as I did.

Materials:

- 100% Mercerized Cotton thread (Sinfonia brand), average thickness approximately 3mm. Colors: Lilac, purple, white and black with 2.5 mm hook
- 100% Mercerized Cotton thread (Eulali brand), average thickness approximately 1mm. Colors: mango and Mexican pink with 1.5 mm hook
- 10mm safety eyes and black felt.
- Black sewing thread for embroidering details on the face
- Old Rose embroidery thread number 3088
 (129) for more details on the face.
- Wire to articulate the amigurumi (I used 4 pipe cleaners)
- Wool needle
- Scissors
- Time marker
- Pins
- Stuffing for amigurumis
- Silicone glue (to melt on the base of the body and joints)

Abbreviations:

• R: Round

• ch: chain

• AM: Magic ring

• pb: single crochet

• dec: decrease (sc 2tog)

• inc: increase (2 sc in 1 stitch)


• dc: double crochet

hdc: half double crochet

• ss: slip stitch

• FLO: Front Loop Only

• BLO: Back Loop Only





Arms (x2)

Start using white yarn

R1: MR 6sc R2-4: 6sc

R5: (1sc, 1dec) x2 (4)

R6: 4sc

R7: (1sc, 1inc) x2 (6)

R8-10: 6sc

R11: (2sc, 1inc) x2 Change to lilac yarn

R12: BLO 8ss

Note: Each time you change colors, be sure to pull the strand of the previous color taut and at the end of the round, tighten firmly to secure.

R14-19: 8sc

Cut the thread leaving a long section to make a perfect closure with the help of a wool needle. This will make it easier to join it to the body later.

The perfect cast off is done with a tapestry needle. After cutting and pulling out the yarn, skip a stitch and pass the needle under the next chain. Then, insert the needle again into the last single crochet you made. For greater clarity, I invite you to watch the video just once and you will understand it easily. Every time you make a perfect cast off, you will follow this same process.

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Sleeve flounce

Use purple thread.

Work in the front strands that we have left free in R11.

Start with 2ch, in the same strand start 4dc, work 4dc in each strand that we have left free, then close with 1sss.

When finished, cut the thread, leaving enough thread to make a perfect closure.




Fingers

Use white thread 3ch, BLO 2ss, 1ss between R1 and 2, (4ch, BLO 3ss, 1ss more in the next stitch embracing the entire R1)x4

When you finish the second finger, make the slip stitch at the same base where you made the slip stitch of the first finger. Similarly, the slip stitch of the fourth finger should be made at the base of the third finger. This is necessary due to the limited number of stitches. If you find it necessary, you can refer to the video for more clarity.

Start using lilac yarn

R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16)

R3: (1sc, 1inc) x8 (24) R4: (3sc, 1inc) x6 (30)

R5: BLO 30sc

R6-7: 30sc

R8: (4sc, 1inc)x6 (36)

R9-10: 36sc

At the end of round 10, remove the marker (if you are using a thread like I did). Place the base on a flat surface, as this is the time to apply hot glue to the base. Make sure to heat the glue gun well, allowing the glue to spread itself. Let it cool without moving it from the surface, and wait long enough until it is completely cold and hard. This will create a flat base that will provide ideal support for the amigurumi to stand on its own. If you prefer, you can replace the glue with plastic; I just don't recommend cardboard, as if the amigurumi gets wet in the future, it could lose its shape.

R13-29: 42sc

R30: (5sc, 1dec) x6 (36)

R31-32: 36sc

R33: (4sc, 1dec) x6 (30)

R34-35: 30sc

R36: (3sc, 1dec) x6 (24)

R37: 24sc

R38: (4sc, 1dec) x4 (20)



Union with arms

R46: 5sc, 8sc on one arm, 10sc, 8sc on other arm, 5sc (36)

The most important thing is to make sure that the smallest of the five fingers is facing the same direction, that is, forward.

R47: 36sc R48: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30) Change to white thread

R50: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24)

The chains you see are just to secure for the

moment.

Shoulder ruffle

Use purple thread. Work in the front strands that we have left free in R48. Start with 2ch, in the same strand start 2dc, work 4dc in each strand that we have left free, to close 1ss.

When finished, cut the thread, leaving enough thread to make a perfect closure.

Between the ruffle we have made and round 49 of the body, we will use lilac thread to make slip stitches, which will add a unique finish. Finally, make a perfect closure.

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Before continuing, it's time to prepare the pipe cleaners: one for each arm, bent, and two for the center of the body or whatever wire you prefer, leaving some extra to join them together in the neck area. Using pipe cleaners can be a bit tricky because of their fragility, but if you use another type of wire in the narrower areas of the arms, it will be much easier to insert them. For this same reason, in the center of the body I used an additional stick just to make insertion easier, which I removed later. Once the pipe cleaners are in place, it is necessary to stuff the body both in front of and behind the wires. The arms do not need stuffing, but if you want to add some, you can do so.



When using pipe cleaners, the wool covering the wire is sufficient as filler in the neck area. However, if you use another type of wire, be sure to fill well around the wire in the neck area to get a firm finish.



Prepare the 10mm safety eyes. First, take some black felt and make a small hole in the center. Insert the safety eye through the hole, then, using scissors, trim the felt around the eye, leaving about 2-3mm of space around it. Repeat the process to prepare both eyes.

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Use pins to position the safety eyes. Place them between rounds 65 and 66, leaving about 10 stitches of space between them. It is important to check this spacing carefully before attaching the eyes, as once placed, they will cover several stitches around them.

Between rows 61 and 62, place the pins to mark the position of the mouth, leaving a gap of 4 stitches. For a better understanding of this step, I recommend watching the video tutorial.

Embroider these details using black sewing thread and a sewing needle.

Embroider the nose just above round 64, forming a triangle as centered as possible in relation to the mouth.

This last stitch at the bottom of the nose will give it a nicer finish. Continue embroidering as many stitches as necessary to shape the nose.

For the rest of the embroidered details, such as the eyebrows and the marks under the mouth, if the pictures are not enough, I recommend watching the video, where you can follow each stitch in detail. For the embroidery in old rose, use all the strands of the embroidery thread.

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R75: (6sc, 1dec)x6 (42) R76: (5sc, 1dec)x6 (36) R77: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30) R78: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24) R79: (2sc, 1dec)x6 (18) R80: (1sc, 1dec)x6 (12)

R81: 12sc

The stuffing for the head can be placed when you consider it appropriate. After finishing round 81, cut the thread leaving enough length to close with a tapestry needle.

Dress flounce:

Use lilac thread

Work in the strands that we left free from R10

R1: 1ch, in the same start FLO 36sc (36)

R2: (1sc, 1inc)x18 (54) R3: (2sc, 1inc)x18 (72)

R4-6: 72sc

R7: (3sc, linc)x18 (90)

R8: 90sc

R9: (4sc, linc)x18 (108)

R10-13: 108sc

When finished cut the thread leaving enough thread to make a perfect closure.



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Detail on the edge Use purple thread Start with 2ch, in the strand of your choice, in the same strand start 3dc, make 3dc in each stitch of the previous R.

When finished, cut the thread, leaving enough thread to make a perfect closure.

Hair

Use black yarn

R1: MR 6sc R2: 6inc (12)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x6 (18) R4: (2sc, 1inc)x6 (24)

R5: 1ss, (36ch, in the 3rd row start 34hdc, 1ss)x24

When finished, cut the yarn leaving enough length to take it to the back and secure it properly.

To attach the hair to the head, I'll be using silicone glue, but if you prefer to sew it for extra security, you can do so without any problem. First, line up the center of the back of the head with the center of the magic ring we made at the beginning of the hair. Then, start attaching the back strands, making sure to cover everything well with white thread. On the front, I've left nine strands, separating 4 to one side and 5 to the other. If you have 8 strands left, that would be ideal, but remember that the hair doesn't need to be perfect.

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The most important thing is that you don't cover too much of the details of the face. If this explanation and the pictures are not enough, I recommend watching the video in which we show you how to put all the hair in place step by step and without cutting. Use pins to arrange all the hair in place before fixing it. Then, you can attach it using silicone glue or stitching, depending on your preference.

Start using purple yarn

R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24) R4: (3sc, 1inc)x6 (30)

R5-7: 30sc

R8: (4sc, 1inc)x6 (36)

R9-10: 36sc

R11: FLO (1sc, 1inc)x18 (54)

R12: (2sc, 1inc)x18 (72)

R13-15: 72sc

R16: (3sc, 1inc)x18 (90)

R17: 90sc

R18: (4sc, linc)x18 (108)

R19-22: 108sc

When finished, cut the thread, leaving enough thread to make a perfect closure.

Detail of the hat edge

Use lilac BLO yarn (1ch, 1ss)x108.

When finished, cut the yarn leaving enough length to take it to the back and secure it properly.

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Small Cempasuchil flowers (x50)

Use 1mm thick thread (Eulali) mango color, 1.5mm hook.

Start with 1 slip knot

12ch, in the 3rd start 1hdc, 1ss (3ch, in the same base 1hdc, 1ss in the next ch)x12

When you're done, leave the thread long enough to form the flower. Roll it up and, at the bottom, make a few stitches using a wool needle. For a better understanding, I suggest you watch the video where the process is explained step by step.

Medium Cempasuchil flower

Use 1mm thick thread (Eulali) mango color, 1.5mm hook.

Start with 1 slip knot 16ch, in the 4th start 1dc, 1ss (4ch, in the same base 1dc, 1ss in the next ch)x12 1ch to secure

When you're done, leave the thread long enough to form the flower. Roll it up and, at the bottom, make a few stitches using a wool needle. For a better understanding, I suggest you watch the video where the process is explained step by step.

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Feathers (x2)

Use 1mm thick thread (Eulali) in Mexican Pink, 1.5mm hook.

Start with 1 slip knot



15ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, begin 2ss

(3ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 2ss, 1 more ss in the next ch)x2 (4ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 3ss, 1 more ss in the next ch)x2 (5ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 4ss, 1 more ss in the next ch)x8 1 more ss on the other side of the ch

(5ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 4ss, 1 more ss in the next ch) x8 (4ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 3ss, 1 more ss in the next ch)x2 (3ch, in the 2nd ch from the hook, 2ss, 1 more ss in the next ch)x2 12ss across the center

When finished, cut the strand and secure it using the strand from the beginning. For a better understanding, I suggest you watch the video we have shared, where the process is shown in detail. https://youtu.be/e12eD8pPvEA?t=300







We will attach all the smaller flowers to the top of the hat and the remaining ones to the dress. The two medium flowers will go on each side of the face, and the feathers will also be placed on the hat. To attach all these details, we will first use pins to position them as you like, and then we will fix them with glue. Pay attention to the pictures and, if necessary, check out the video. Remember that you can also place the decorations according to your own taste. For a better understanding, I suggest you watch the video we have shared, where the process is shown in detail.
