This amigurumi is worked with tight V-shaped and spiral stitches. Do not close off each row unless indicated; make sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before starting.

We have a tutorial on our channel to make this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions.

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This Cuqui is approximately 9 inches (23 cm) tall.

Materials:

- We used 100% mercerized cotton yarn, approximately 3 mm thick with 6 strands, in the following colors: Skin tone (30g), Aqua, and Lilac, with a 2.5 mm hook.
- Super fine thread (sewing thread) in black, only for embroidering the eyes.
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Temporary marker
- Pins
- Stuffing for amigurumis
- Velcro for the dress closure

Abbreviations:

- R: Round
- ch: chain stitch
- MR: Magic ring
- sc: single crochet
- dec: decrease (close 2 sc together)
- inc: Increase (2sc in 1 stitch)
- dc: double crochet
- hdc: half double crochet
- ss: Slip stitch
- FLO: Front Loop Only (take only the front strand)
- BLO: Back Loop Only (take only the back strand)

Important Note:

This pattern can be adapted to create amigurumi of different sizes using yarn of different thicknesses. Adjust the hook size according to the thickness of the yarn selected. Also consider the size of the safety eyes if you decide to use them.

I hope you enjoy designing this pattern for yourself as much as I did.



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
BODY

Use flesh-colored yarn.


Start with 1 sliding knot

R1: 16ch, in the 2nd start, (14sc, 1sc triple)x2 (34)

R2: 15sc, 1inc, 16sc, 1inc, 1sc (36)

R3-5: 36sc

R6: 15sc, 1dec, 16sc, 1dec, 1sc (34)

♦ Note: It is normal for the body to tend to lean slightly due to the spiral pattern. Don't worry, as this will be corrected when we add the filling.

Throughout the body, whether in rounds with increases or decreases, there will always be two. It is essential to follow the instructions in the pattern, but if you notice that the increases or decreases are not lining up well on the sides, you can make slight adjustments in the rounds. This is because each person knits with a different tension, which can slightly tilt the stitches.

If you notice that your crochet is leaning more than expected, it doesn't mean that it is wrong, but in that case, you can modify the beginning and end of each round. If your crochet is straight, continue the pattern without changes.

A useful tip is to identify the sides of the fabric well and mark them with temporary markers before working the rounds with increases or decreases. This will help you maintain a balanced structure.

- R35: 2sc, 1triple dec, 13sc, 1triple dec, 11sc (28)
- R36: 1sc, 1triple dec, 11sc, 1triple dec, 10sc (24)
- R37: (1triple dec, 9sc)x2 (20)

♦ Note: The same goes for triple increases and decreases, which must be well aligned to maintain the symmetrical shape of the body.

♦ Note: When you finish the body, cut the thread and pull it out leaving enough thread to close the opening with a tapestry needle. Make sure to distribute the stitches well when closing to maintain a uniform and neat shape.

ARMS (X2)

- R1: MR 6sc
- R2: 6sc
- R3: 2sc, 1bobble st: 4hdc, 3sc (6)
- R4-18: 6sc

♦ Note: The bobble stitch consists of making 4 half double crochets (hdc) on the same base and closing them together. If you prefer, you can also do it with 3 half double crochets for a more compact finish.

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LEGS (X2)

R1: MR 8sc

R2: (3sc, 1inc)x2 (10)

R3-4: 10sc

R5: (3sc, 1dec)x2 (8)

R6-18: 8sc

At the end of each arm, cut the thread leaving enough thread to close the opening with a tapestry needle, making a seam closure from side to side. These arms do not have stuffing, so this type of closure will help maintain their proper shape.

Note: The legs are sewn in the same way as the arms, passing the thread from side to side with a wool needle. Unlike the arms, the legs are stuffed, and you can add as much as you prefer. I have chosen to leave approximately 6 rounds without stuffing so that they are more flexible and allow better movement.



Let's start stuffing the body, keeping in mind that these little dolls don't need to be as firm as traditional amigurumis. Add enough stuffing to give them shape, but without overdoing it, so that they are soft and comfortable even for the littlest ones at home.

Once stuffed, use a tapestry needle to close completely, taking a strand from each side to achieve a clean, even finish.

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We will join the legs right in the center of the base of the body. Our guide will be the small holes left after making R1. For correct placement, count three holes inward from the base of the triple increases.

Each strand of each leg should be pulled back to the same central point. This way, you can secure them together and then easily hide the strands, achieving a firm and clean join.

Join the arms approximately between R18 and R19, making sure to place them symmetrically on each side of the body. Use the excess thread from each arm to sew them together with a tapestry needle, securing them well so that they are firm but still have some mobility.

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Let's embroider the eyes following the pin guide. The yellow pins are located between R27 and R28, with three points of separation between them and as centered as possible on the face. Place the rest of the pins according to the reference and follow the guide in the images for greater precision.

Embroider the eyes using a double strand of black sewing thread to achieve a more defined finish. For a more detailed understanding, we invite you to enjoy our explanatory video.




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Embroider the nose between R26 and R27, making only three stitches with the same flesh-colored yarn. When you finish, do not cut the yarn, as you can use it to embroider the ears next.

Embroider each ear between R28 and R29, 2 stitches apart from each eye. For this technique, we will use the worm stitch or rococo stitch, which consists of turning the thread around the tapestry needle 10 times before passing it through the fabric. Make sure you hold the worm firmly with your fingertips before pulling the needle to maintain its shape.



Adding blush to the cheeks is optional. If you want a softer, more expressive finish, you can apply it lightly with blush powder, fabric paint or pastel pencils. Adjust the intensity according to your preference to give your little doll a special touch.

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
HAIR

Use coral color yarn

Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 25ch, in the 2nd start, BLO 24hdc (24)

R2-12: 1ch, turn 24hdc (24)

R13-14: 16ch, in the 3rd start 14hdc (14)

Note: Finish the piece with a chain stitch to secure and cut the strand, leaving enough to form the hair. From the other end, thread the needle through the entire top, including the strands. Pull tight to close completely, secure on the inside and hide the strand.

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Using two strands of the same yarn and a tapestry needle, secure a lock on each side with single stitches. Leave the ends free for about 6 stitches. For a better understanding, please refer to the video we have shared."

TOP

Use lilac color yarn

Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 31ch, in the 2nd begin BLO 14hdc, 2ss, 14hdc


R2: 2ch, turn, BLO 14hdc, 2ss, 14hdc, 1ch to secure.

Using a strand of the same color, add a detail to the center of the top. Wrap the center 6 times, or as many times as you like. Secure with a knot in the back and hide all the remaining strands.

Add velcro to close the top, and also to the head and hair. Everything is optional; if you prefer, you can attach it with glue or sewing.


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COLA

Use Aqua color yarn

R1: MR 2ch, 6dc, 1ss (6)

When finished, pass the strand back, secure it and hide it.

R2: 2ch, 6dc inc, 1ss (12)

R3: 2ch, (1dc, 1dc inc)x6, 1ss (18)

R4: 2ch, 18dc, 1ss (18)

R5: 2ch, (2dc, 1dc inc)x6, 1ss (24)

R6: 2ch, (3dc, 1dc inc)x6, 1ss (30)

R7-12: 2ch, 30dc, 1ss (30) Change to lilac

R13: (2ch, 1hdc in the same base, skip 1 stitch, 1ss)x15

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FINS

Use lilac color yarn

Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 26ch, in the 3rd start, 7dc, 2hdc, 1sc, 4ss, 1sc, 2hdc, 7dc (24)

R2-4: 2ch, turn, BLO 7dc, 2hdc, 1sc, 4ss, 1sc, 2hdc, 7dc, 1ch to secure (24)


Note: These flaps are knitted in a very similar way to the top. When finished, hide the strands.

Consider this part as the back of the tail. Using a tapestry needle and two strands of purple thread, join the fins together. If you prefer to glue them, you can do that too. To see how to sew this, check out the video we shared.
