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You can sell the finished product of your amigurumi however you prefer. If you decide to sell your finished item online, please include a link to our website in the description. This way, you'll also be supporting our project.

Important Note:

This amigurumi is worked with tightly knit X and spiral stitches. Do not cast off each row unless indicated; be sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before beginning. We have a tutorial on our channel for making this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions. If you find any errors in this pattern, please contact me.



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Saint Nicholas of Bari is approximately 15cm (6 inches) tall.

Materials:

- We used 100% mercerized cotton yarn, which is approximately 3 mm thick and has 6 strands, in the colors: Flesh White or skin, Red (Burdeos) and Gold
- with a 2.5 mm needle.
- Needle to work
- Scissors
- Time marker
- Stuffing for amigurumi
- Silicone glue
- Wire (for articulating arms and head)
- Wire for the cane
- Black sewing thread (for embroidering eyes)
- You will need a plastic circle to create a flat base (or a large button)

Abbreviations:

- R: Round
- ch: chain stitch
- MR: Magic ring
- sc: single crochet
- dec: decrease (close 2 sc together)
- inc: Increase (2sc in 1 stitch)
- dc: doble crochet
- hdc: half double crochet
- ss: Slip stitch
- FLO: Front Loop Only (take only the front strand)
- BLO: Back Loop Only (take only the back strand)

Important note:

This pattern can be adapted to create amigurumi of different sizes with different yarn thicknesses. Adjust the crochet hook size according to the yarn thickness you choose. Also consider the size of the safety eyes, if you decide to use them.

I hope you enjoy designing this pattern as much as I did.



Copyright

To knit the body, we'll use white and flesh-colored yarn. However, if you access one of the shared links, you'll see that this example uses a different color. Don't worry, the guide and steps are exactly the same, regardless of the color you see in the link.

ARMS (X2)


Start using the flesh or skin color

R1: MR 8sc

R2-5: 8sc

In the last sc of R5 Change to white color yarn

R6: FLO 8inc (16)

R7: 16sc

R8: 16sc reverse

R9-11: 16sc

At the end of R11, it is necessary to accommodate the hand inside the sleeve to ensure that it is properly positioned.



R12: (2sc, 1dec)x4 (12)

R13-16: 12sc

R17: (1sc, 1dec)x4 (8)

Make a perfect seal at the end of each arm. This will make it easier to join it to the body later and ensure a clean and neat finish.

BODY

Start the body using white yarn

R1: MR 8sc

R2: 8inc (16)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24)

R4: (2sc, 1inc)x8 (32)

R5: 1sc, 1inc, (3sc, 1inc)x7, 2sc (40)

R6: 40sc reverse

R7-8: 40sc.

After finishing R8, place the base on a flat surface and apply hot glue. Make sure to heat your glue gun very well, as the heat will allow the base to set itself. When the glue cools, the base will be firm, allowing your amigurumi to stand up nicely on its own.

If you prefer, you can also add a button the size of the base, or cut a piece of plastic that works well as reinforcement. I don't recommend using cardboard, as it could warp over time and affect the stability of your amigurumi.



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R9: (3sc, 1dec)x8 (32)

R10-14: 32sc

R15: (6sc, 1dec)x4 (28)

R16-20: 28sc

R21: (5sc, 1dec)x4 (24)

R22-24: 24sc

R25: 4sc, 4sc joining one arm, 8sc, 4sc joining another arm, 4sc (24)

For this arm join, you'll work the stitch from the inside out, and in turn, a stitch from the body. Unlike the next round, where you'll work in each stitch you left undone on each arm.

R26: 4sc, 4sc joining in one arm, 8sc, 4sc in other arm, 4sc (24)


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R27: 24 sc

After R26, add stuffing to the body before continuing to cast off. Be careful not to put too much stuffing so the base stays flat and the amigurumi remains stable.

R31: FLO 12inc (24)

R32: (1sc, 1inc)x12 (36)

After R32, I suggest you add a little more stuffing to the body, especially around the wire in the neck area, to ensure a firm and stable shape.

R28: 12dec (12) Change to the same color yarn that I use on hands

R29-30: 12sc

When you finish R30, add wire to each arm. This is optional; if you prefer, you can leave the arms without wire. However, adding wire will leave the excess on the head, allowing for a very tender position for Mary, especially when she faces the baby Jesus.

R33-43: 36sc

R44: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30)

R45: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24)

Add stuffing to the head after finishing R45, trying to keep the wire as centered as possible. Keep in mind that when you finish the last round of the head, you can add more stuffing if you consider it necessary to give it the correct shape.



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R46: (2sc, 1dec)x6 (18)

R47: (1sc, 1dec)x6 (12)

R48: 12sc

When finishing R12, cut the yarn leaving enough length to completely close the head using a yarn needle.

You've finished one body. Remember to repeat this process one more time, using the correct colors for each character or the ones you've chosen.


LET'S CONTINUE EMBROIDERING THE EYES.

Place pins between R36 and R37, leaving approximately 8 stitches between them. Then, further up, between R37 and R38, place two pins for each eye, forming a triangle.

Use black, double-stranded thread to embroider the eyes, using the pins as a guide to achieve a neat, symmetrical position. You can watch the video for more details on the process.

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Layer

Start using red yarn

Begin with slip knot

R1: 19ch, in the 2nd begin BLO 14hdc, 4sc (18)

R2: 1ch, turn, BLO 4sc, 14hdc (18)

For the following rounds, repeat the following 7 more times:

R3: 1ch, turn, BLO 14hdc, 4sc (18)

R4: 1ch, turn, BLO 4sc, 14hdc (18)

R5-R16: Repeat R3 and R4 a total of 6 more times

After completing R16, make a chain stitch to secure the weaving, and cut the yarn leaving just enough to hide it. [Link to video](#)



Using gold-colored thread, make slip stitches all around the edge, starting at the top left corner and finishing at the other end with 1 chain stitch to secure. For further understanding, please watch the video. [Link to video](#)



Small cape.

Use red yarn.

Start with 1 slip knot.

R1: 5ch, in the 2nd chain begin 4sc.

R2-26: 1 ch, turn. BLO 4sc

1ch to secure With gold colored thread slide along the entire edge except at the top, as well as the previous piece. [Link to video](#)



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Join both pieces, the larger one as centered as possible. The smaller piece should have approximately one thumb's width on each side and behind it, marking where we will join. This is important to achieve a longer cape and to prevent it from being too thick around the neck.

Using a gold-colored thread, I made three stitches to close the cape; this cape can then be placed on the body. [Link to video](#)



Cassock Use red yarn

Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 19 ch, in the 2nd start BLO 14 hdc, 4 sc (18)

R2: 1 ch, turn, BLO 4 sc, 14 hdc (18)

R3: 1 ch, turn, BLO 14 hdc, 4 sc (18)

R4: 1 ch, turn, BLO 4 sc, 14 hdc (18)

1 ch, to secure and hide the strand

With a strand of gold-colored thread, embroider the cross; these are simple stitches that you can do to your liking. [Link to video](#)



Tie the cassock as close to the neck as possible.

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Mitra (hat) (x2)

Use red yarn [Link to video](#)

R1: MR 6sc

R2: (1sc, 1inc)x3 (9)

R3: 9sc

R4: (2sc, 1inc)x3 (12)

R5: (2sc, 1inc)x4 (16)

R6: (3sc, 1inc)x4 (20)

R7: (4sc, 1inc)x4 (24)

R8: 24sc

R9: 2sc, 1inc, (5sc, 1inc)x3, 3sc (28)

R10: 28sc

R11: (6sc, 1inc)x4 (32)

R12: (3sc, 1inc)x8 (40)

R13: 1sc, 1inc, (4sc, 1inc)x7, 3sc (48)

R14: closing 23sc.

To close, take the next stitch and the second-to-last stitch of the last round. When finishing one piece, make 1 chain stitch to secure and cut off the yarn. But when finishing the second piece, do not cut the yarn to continue joining both.

Embroider the cross using a gold-colored thread, the same technique as the cassock cross, with the difference that you can keep the stitches hidden. Please see the video for further understanding.

Continue joining both pieces, keep in mind that you will make 24 sc in each piece, even though you closed the piece with 23 sc, you will always start the 1st stitch right at the point you did not work for the closure, the last one of R13.

R15: 24sc in each piece (48)



R16: 48sc. Change color to Gold

R17: BLO 47ss.

Cut the yarn leaving enough for an invisible closure. If this is your first time, I recommend watching the video.

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Eyebrows (x2)

Use white thread.

Start with 1 sliding knot.

4ch, from the 2nd to the 3ss,

1ch to secure. Hide the ends.

Before placing the eyebrows, put on the mitre; that way it will be easier.


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For the cane, use wire of your desired thickness; this is very thin florist's wire, and I used approximately 8 inches. Wrap the entire wire and then shape it as shown in the image.
